Methods of Instruction

Self-exploration	Students will reflect on their gender development through discussions/ prompts.
Participation	Students will participate in class discussion, activities, and assignments during each class meeting.
Lecture	Instructors will lecture on key curriculum- centered topics as a way to establish context for readings, written assignments, and examinations.
Discussion	Students will join in class and/or group discussions on curriculum- centered topics, readings and other relevant topics.
Collaborative/Team	Students will work in groups on assigned topics/readings and assignments.
Technology-based instruction	Students will compose and edit their writing on computers and use online library databases to conduct research. Accessing social media sources for cultural expression of gender will be included.

College level or pre-collegiate essays	Students will write a minimum of 2 -3 essays during the semester 80% done out of the classroom and 20% during in-class instruction time.	In and Out of Class
Tests/Quizzes/Examinations	Students will complete final assessments on course concepts. They may be short answer, multiple choice and/or true false questions. They may be written assignments/reflections/essays done in class instruction time. 80% done during in-class and 20% out of class. There should be a minimum of two examinations over the semester.	In and Out of Class
Group activity participation/observation	Students will participate in group activities on course concepts. They will observe groups and offer feedback.	In Class Only
Guided/unguided journals	Students will complete journals entries over the course of the semester for review.	Out of Class Only
